Message From the Chairman of the Board

1998 was a banner year for ACCION New Mexico. In our fourth year of operations, we passed the \$1 million mark in funds lent to Albuquerque-area small businesses. We completed a major market study and strategic planning process, and developed and implemented a sweeping new set of lending policies in response to market forces and demand. As a result, we saw our portfolio double.



More importantly, we saw our clients thrive. Their participation was key to our planning. Our retailored loan products and services further helped them succeed. Time and time again at ACCION New Mexico, we see that a small investment of hope and credit can set a business on the track for success. We hear comments such as, "ACCION got the ball rolling for me," or "I owe my business to ACCION." And we see, as with Brigette Lopez (p.5) and Francisco and Nancy Simbaña (p.3), that the success of a small business ripples out to create opportunities for individuals, families and broader communities.

The beauty of ACCION New Mexico's work is that it is not charity. Rather, it is a helping hand to people who are already working hard to build their businesses and fulfill their dreams.

We are delighted that communities are recognizing the value of this work. Reflecting this, ACCION New Mexico received more than \$480,000 in contributions in 1998 — an increase of forty-five percent over 1997. In March 1999, we were deeply honored to receive a City of Albuquerque Human Rights Award.

I thank our Board, staff, volunteers, donors and especially our clients, for contributing to this remarkable enterprise of hope and opportunity.

Brigette Lopez Papa Nachos Restaurant

When Brigette Lopez worked as a caterer, people raved about her cooking. In 1994 she decided to take the plunge and start a restaurant. Brigette and her family pooled their savings and opened "Papa Nachos." The business is truly a family affair. Brigette's sisters as well as their children, friends and husbands are always there pitching in, from sweeping and mopping to waiting on tables and cooking. "This is home," says Brigette's niece Sabrina.

As Papa Nachos slowly grew, Brigette saw that productivity would increase significantly if she had a tamale machine. She approached several banks for help, but could not qualify for a loan.

Then a customer told Brigette about ACCION New Mexico. Five days later, she had \$500 in hand. "They gave me a loan when no one else would," Brigette says. She used the money to buy the tamale maker, and, as she predicted, her productivity shot up. "It cut my work by more than half," she says.

Business was improving, but then hardship struck. The restaurant lost its lease and had to move. At the same time, Brigette's husband went into the hospital for heart surgery.

Thankfully, the local community was there to help. A customer who is an attorney helped negotiate a new lease. Other customers organized a caravan of trucks and cars for moving day. And ACCION New Mexico was there with the \$2,000 needed to remodel the new site.


Now, Papa Nachos is starting to turn a healthy profit. "It was a great challenge and we did it," Brigette says, smiling, "It's a great feeling."

ACCION NEW MEXICO Wins Human Rights Award

ACCION New Mexico was recently honored with a 1999 City of Albuquerque Human Rights Award. The award is given yearly to individuals or organizations that have promoted and supported human rights and human dignity, equal opportunity, and the elimination of discrimination. In making the award, the City of Albuquerque Human Rights Board issued the following remarks:

ACCION New Mexico, a community based grassroots economic empowerment organization, is being honored with a Human Rights Award for its work in increasing access for minorities to business credit, loans and training to entrepreneurs. For over five years, ACCION has worked diligently at breaking down barriers to economic self-reliance and providing economic opportunity for hardworking entrepreneurs in Albuquerque.

Accepting the award on behalf of the agency, ACCION New Mexico President and CEO Anne Haines Yatskowitz remarked, "With unity, the community of people involved with ACCION New Mexico — tortilla makers, bankers, seamstresses, attorneys, artisans and accountants to name a few — have joined together to tear down the walls of economic disenfranchisement. We are impassioned by the belief that regardless of race, culture, ethnicity, gender or income, everybody deserves a fair chance to be independent."





1998 HIGHLIGHTS: Responding to Our Clients

In 1998, ACCION New Mexico found new, exciting ways to address client needs. Increased capital from our fundraising efforts and new loan products helped us double our portfolio in just six months — all while maintaining high asset quality.

We saw our clients reach new levels of success. Michael and Jamie Ford won the 1998 U.S. Small Business Administration Welfare to Work Entrepreneur of the Year Award for the state of New Mexico. With the growing income from two home-based businesses, the Fords and their three children became financially independent from public assistance. Merlinda Sedillo Welch and her fiery homemade salsa were featured in Forbes and on CNN, and Melinda Kenefic and Francisco Simbaña served as small business advocates with Leadership Albuquerque.

Early in 1998, ACCION New Mexico took a close look at how to be even more responsive to our clients' needs. Our clients were integral participants in this work, serving on committees, participating in market studies and chairing task forces.

Between May and September, we implemented a number of significant recommendations:

- We raised the limit for first-time loans from \$5,000 to \$15,000, so we could better serve a range of small business needs.
- We lowered our interest rate from 16 percent to a scale of 11-14 percent, based on client payment history and the amount of the loan.
- We raised the maximum loan amount for established clients to \$50,000 and instituted revolving lines of credit and re-financing options.

Inspired by the energy and initiative of our clients, 11 donors joined together as Challenge Partners, pledging \$220,000 in matching funds. They helped ACCION New Mexico raise over \$480,000 in 1998, 45 percent more than the year before. We were also fortunate to form a partnership with Diamond Shamrock DSRM Bank, which sends two employees each week to volunteer their expertise in our office.

With solid community and volunteer support and our dedicated staff, ACCION New Mexico is well equipped to enter the new millennium, fostering the entrepreneurial spirit and helping our clients realize their dreams.

ENTREPRENEURS of the Year: Our 1998 Winners

Francisco and Nancy Simbaña arrived from Ecuador in 1979 with \$200. They spoke no English and had two small children.
Francisco worked in construction and laundromats to make ends meet while Nancy taught Spanish in the public schools.

A decade later, the Simbañas were surviving, but not earning enough to fulfill their dream of sending their children to college. So they started a janitorial business, Preferred Maintenance. For the next five years they worked regular jobs by day and ran their business at night. "It takes time and sacrifice to build something," says Francisco.

After securing a major janitorial contract, the Simbañas needed capital to invest in new equipment. Unable to obtain a bank loan, they turned to ACCION New Mexico. "I don't ask for breaks, I ask only for a chance to compete," emphasizes Francisco.

Two ACCION loans later, Preferred Maintenance, Inc. has 35 employees and annual sales of \$500,000. More importantly to the Simbañas, daughter Alexandra attends the University of New Mexico and son Juancarlos is a stockbroker.

"We were blessed to find ACCION New Mexico, not only for their financial support, but for helping us fulfill our dreams," declare Nancy and Francisco.
